
Ladies and Guns, They Do Mix

About a year and a half ago a couple of ladies at the bank where we do business inquired to John, our treasurer while he was there making a deposit. if there was someone in our club that would teach them how to shoot. What started out as a couple of interested ladies turned into 10 ladies (9 from that one bank) and our first Ladies Beginner Pistol class. They learned a lot and had a great time, even taking on the monogram of the "Dirty Harriets". Just last week we completed our fourth Ladies Beginner Pistol class and it was one of the best yet. Many types have taken this class from ladies that have never fired or touched a gun in their life, those where their husband has guns in the house and they want to be more comfortable around them, those who like the idea of shooting but just didn't have experience or know where to start, and finally those whose significant other said "sure honey I'll teach you how to shoot" and took them into the woods and handed them a .44 mag only to scare them half to death and turn them off to guns. This class is for all those ladies and more. First and foremost, husbands and boy friends are not invited, only ladies may attend this class. Most of our ladies agree that husbands and boy friends are not the best ones to teach them to use a gun.

This is a six week class at one night a week for three hours each night and takes them from the very beginning. They learn about various types of handguns, single action, double action, and semi autos. How they work, how to unload and make them safe, safe handling, how to clean them, and how to accurately shoot them, and more. This is a combination of classroom instruction and significant live fire time. They all start with .22 caliber only and by the 5th or 6th week can try bigger calibers (9mm, .38spl, .357 mag, .40, .45 ACP) if they want to, and most do. Instruction is provided by an NRA instructor with several coaches helping with the live fire to give more personal instruction and to help ensure safety during live fire. The only cost to the ladies is ammo as our instructor and coaches bring their personal firearms for the ladies to use.

I have the utmost respect for all the ladies that attend this class whether they



continue in the sport or decide it is not for them. I remember one who was not sure if she wanted anything to do with guns, a bit of a liberal, but wanted to find out what it was all about. She went through 5 of the six class sessions, even bought a gun, and was one of our better shots, she was a natural. Just prior to the last class she decided that guns were not for her and sold her gun. I respect her for taking the time to find out what is was all about and making her decision based on facts and experience, not on fear or political rhetoric.

Unbeknownst to us another overcame her personal emotional distress of firearms by taking this class. Turns out her father committed suicide with a gun. She did great and even shot bigger calibers to decide she wants to stick with .22 caliber guns. After completing the class her husband went out and bought her a Ruger Mark III as a gift, she was so excited.

Another had never shot a gun before and on the first night of live fire it took her almost 5 minutes to pull that trigger for the first time, and then she closed her eyes and jumped when she did. I doubt she shot more than 20 rounds that night. She has since taken her husband to a gun show where they bought matching .22 caliber target pistols and then her husband surprised her with a Ruger 10/22 for Christmas. Now they are planning to build a little shooting range on their property just for their new .22's.

This class has become so popular that our next two classes (April and October) are already booked with a waiting list started. Our goal is to keep holding these classes as long as there are ladies interested in learning how to safely handle a gun. As a bonus, even though it is not the focus of the class, those ladies that want to can buy the NRA book and take the test and will then be eligible for a certificate to obtain a CHL. Even a few husbands have thanked us for this class as now their wives are no longer afraid of guns and even participate in their hobby. It's not oil and water, ladies and guns do mix well.

Turn-In-Poachers (T.I.P.)

The Turn-In-Poachers (T.I.P.) reward is paid for information leading to the arrest/conviction of person(s) for the illegal killing, taking, possession or waste of deer, elk, antelope, bear, cougar, big horn sheep, mountain goat, moose, upland game birds, waterfowl. T.I.P. rewards can also be given for the illegal netting, snagging, or dynamiting of salmon, steelhead, sturgeon, or large numbers of any fish listed in Oregon Statute as a game fish. In addition, a reward may be issued for information that results in an arrest/conviction of a person who has illegally obtained Oregon hunting/angling license or tags.

- \$100 game fish
- \$100 upland birds
- \$250 deer, bear, antelope, and cougar
- \$500 elk, big horn sheep, moose, and mountain goat

When reporting a violation, advise the trooper of your interest in requesting the reward.

National Park Service Calls For Lead Ammo Ban

The National Park Service (NPS) has announced its intention to ban traditional ammunition containing lead in all its parks. The move would needlessly push hunters to use more costly bullets made of tungsten, copper, and steel. The restrictions, set to take affect by the end of 2010, were announced without regard to science and without soliciting feedback from sportsmens' groups.

"The NPS announcement demonstrates either complete ignorance or complete arrogance as to the effect that this policy will have on hunters," said NRA-ILA Executive Director Chris W. Cox. "There is no science to support NPS's contention that the use of lead ammunition in hunting is causing environmental contamination, having a negative effect on wildlife, or posing a threat to the health of visitors or park staff. This policy, and the lack of communication in advance with the sportsmen's community, is a deliberate attempt to reduce the number of people who will want to hunt in the 60 parks that are open to hunting. This plays directly into the hands of radical antihunting organizations like the Humane Society of the U.S. which is advocating that hunters be banned from using lead ammunition."

NRA-ILA will continue to be a voice of opposition against this unnecessary action and is committed to protecting the rights of hunters to use the ammo that is best suited for their hunting needs and budget.
