

Basic Topographical Map and Compass Reading

If you are watching the big calendar on the DRRC web page you have certainly noticed that there is another basic topographical map reading and compass class scheduled for the 22nd of August. So, why should you know how to read a map and use a compass when we have all those electronic gadgets to show us the way? Can you find your GPS coordinates on a map? Do you know which datum values your GPS is set for? What the heck is datum, anyhow? Do you know the datum used for your auto GPS and if you have tried to correlate you auto GPS with a hand held GPS they may not agree? Do you know that a map can save a person time when you want to go outside and play? Do you know a person can enhance their hunting enjoyment in any area using a map and compass to do a reconnaissance of the area a person intends to hunt and save time and energy as well as develop a big picture of that area?

A one day class will help bring enjoyment to all of our outdoor experiences. I will explain the user manual for topographical maps and how to integrate the map and compass. Part of the class will be classroom and part will be two compass courses that will help a person develop the knowledge needed read a topographic map and integrate the compass with that map.

The class will start at 9 AM and conclude sometime in the afternoon. Pre-registration is requested. The class fee is \$60, part of which goes to DRRC, and includes a map for the class, a compass, and two small books for reference. You will need to bring a pencil, minimum 12" ruler, pen and paper for notes, and a lunch. We will be in the club house for the classroom portion of the class and out on the range somewhere for the compass courses. Ron tries to keep the poison oak in control but long trousers may be advisable. If you own a GPS, bring it along and you can use it on the compass course to play with.

Silhouette Range Safety Lights

New red safety lights are now installed on the Silhouette Range. These lights are to be used for cold/safe firing lines, exactly as we use the red lights at the 100 Yard range. Lights on means the line is 'cold'/'safe', and no firearms are to be handled. Lights off means the line is 'hot'.

Funding for this safety light project includes a grant from the National Rifle Association Foundation.

Discipline Director Reports

Several Discipline Directors were at the Annual Meeting of the Members and gave reports on their activities. Others emailed in reports for the meeting. Following is a summary of those reports.

Ben Edman reported that the .22 Rimfire Challenge was happening the next day (7/3/15), despite the predicted 95 degree temperature. He has rimfire ammo available for youth shooters. This relatively new discipline is being scheduled quarterly, and has been successful in getting new folks involved

in organized competitions.

Archery Director Frank Womack reports that regular shoots are established on the 2nd Saturdays monthly, using some 3-D targets, and are open to the public. They have worked with youth groups from Boy Scouts, 4-H and Sea Scouts. So far nine 3-D targets are available, and they have 4 youth bows, and 6 adult bows, in a mixture of recurve and compound, LH and RH. And replacement bale target butts have been purchased. Equipment purchases have been supported by a grant from Cabela's and from their Club budget. Facilities improvements include shelving in the Conex storage unit, and planning for a covered shooting line.

Carl Haggland sent a Highpower report, saying the past year the matches had a good showing. The Leupold Cup last August combined with the State Long Range championship again had increased attendance. The October 2014 Long Range / Palma match also had good attendance for that time of year. 2015 started in March with what is becoming our annual Highpower Clinic. This offers those that would like to learn what Highpower is a chance to do so, and try it with the assistance of experienced coaches. April saw the Fields Memorial Match return to its traditional 2-day format. Memorial Day weekend was the Burden Memorial Tournament, all fired at 800, 900 and 1000 yards. Competition was close, but in the end, 18 year old Brianna Rachinski of Lynden, WA came out on top setting two new National Records while doing so. Her score of 1094-66X out of 1100 possible points beat the prior record by 3 points and 12 X's., setting records for Junior and Women categories. June ended with the Oregon State Open Championship, which has had better attendance in previous years, but those who braved the heat had a good time.

Carl reports that upcoming
Highpower events include a Mid-Range
Prone Match July 26th. This will be 3
strings of 20 shots each all fired from
the 600 yard line. It will be an NRA
approved match, so those who would
like to earn a mid-range classification
can do so. August 29 and 30 will again
be the Leupold Cup and Long Range
Championship. 100 shots at 1000 yards
fired over two days. Carl thanks all that
have helped to make this past year a
success; those helping run the matches,
Mike Holder and his RSO's, and the

Club members who have worked to maintain and improve the facility.

Hunter Education Director Bill Hendrix and his team held 5 classes in the past year, graduating approximately 100 hunter Education students and 28 Master Hunter candidates. The numbers seem to be down a bit state-wide, but they are pressing on with additional classes in July and August.

Paul Meier sent word that the Ladies Night discipline is still training new shooters through experienced shooters, they never know what or who will show up. They have been training the ladies for personal protection; they are learning a lot and having a good time. They recently had a lady come out who, while running with her dog, was charged by a coyote. They squared off and using a stick she chased the coyote away. So the program is going to start working on shooting coyotes. Small, shifty target, should be fun! Shooting at the Silhouette Range has opened up what they can do training wise. The recent heat has made it a little hard to grip the pistols, so the ladies are learning to shoot in the heat. Everyone is safe, is having fun, and actually learning something along the way.

The Ladies Beginner Pistol team conducted 5 classes, reports administrator Charlie McAlister. Each class is one night a week, 3 hours per session, for 4 weeks. The maximum is 12 ladies per class. 60 ladies signed up for the 5 classes, and 55 completed the course. The team lost one instructor, but have one or maybe two to replace him.

Charlie also reported that the Beginners Basic Reloading Class was held three times this last year. Class size is limited to 20. 60 signed up for the 3 classes and 60 completed the class. Each class is 6 hours and is held on a Saturday. Cost is \$15 for DRRC members and \$20 for non-members. John Weil is retiring as co-instructor, but Charlie has one or two replacements in mind.

Service Rifle director Todd Hanson held 5 matches in the last year. He reports that 42 first-time shooters took the Friday night classes for new participants. And there were a total of 108 match participants. Approximately 1670 rounds of Club ammo was distributed to the new shooters. Match participation was a high of 36 shooters in March, with a low of 14 shooters in May. Two new (to DRRC) M1 Garands were approved for purchased by the Club and are on order from the CMP.
