# **President's Report**



This last month has been one of victories and losses for DRRC. We've lost a couple of long time members and friends in January and this is never easy to handle. Joe Cole whom many of you know from the range passed away leaving a vacuum among his many long time friends and acquaintances. Our Range Host and friend Joe Cook also passed away quite unexpectedly leaving so many of us shocked at his unexpected passing. There are very few members at the club who don't know one or the both of these two gentlemen that were deserving of our respect and admiration. The club has suffered a great loss by not having both of these men in attendance.

On the legal front, the last two local court cases filed against DRRC by a former member were summarily dismissed by the judge so we are now left with only the two federal court cases filed by the same person. Our legal defense fund has helped DRRC greatly to defend itself financially by covering most of the bills but with more bills expected more help is still needed. The NRA has committed to helping us financially with our legal fees which is a great boost for us both financially as well as for the support this brings DRRC nationally.

Many times in the past a former member of DRRC has made accusations claiming that Michael Iones who is the Executive Officer of the club has been violating the clubs' non-profit status by conducting classes at DRRC. Recently Mr. Jones was called in to the Oregon Department of Justice (DOJ), to review the way that he conducts classes at DRRC. After the DOJ reviewing Mr. Jones' books and interviewing him, Mr. Jones was informed that the DOJ was happy that no non-profit laws had been violated and that his books appeared to be in very good order. It is hoped that this matter can now be put to rest and Michael Jones will no longer have to defend himself against unsubstantiated claims by those who would attack him. Michael donates a tremendous amount of time and energy to DRRC and deserves our continued support and respect. By the way Michael is nearing the end of his term limit and is looking for a member/s to contact him that is interested in doing the Executive Officers job. If you are interested please contact Michael so he can better inform you as to the job responsibilities.

DRRC is now going to be audited by the DOJ in the near future because of a complaint issued by "person/s unnamed". It appears like a complaint was filed against DRRC for financial improprieties, the details



of this complaint so far has not been detailed to us. This appears to be the latest in the attacks on DRRC and once again as in the past we expect to emerge from this trial not only with a clean bill of financial health, but cleared of all charges.

As we really get started into the new year I would encourage all of the club members to become more involved in our club. There are many different disciplines to try, many varied areas of the club that we can help in or donate time to. Many of us older members should consider taking the time to mentor younger or less experienced members in what we enjoy doing on the range. It is a great opportunity to pass on the things we enjoy about shooting to someone who hopefully in turn will do so again further on down the line. As usual I hope to see you on the range, and good shooting.

The best of all was walking into his workshop and saying, "Hi Joe, want to see what I got at the last gun show". After holding up one finger and reaching over to turn down the radio (he was a little hard of

hearing ya know) you would repeat it and his eyes would light up and he would stop whatever he was doing to look at your new toy. He would look it up in one or more of his books to tell you anything you wanted to know about it and what it was worth and then we would talk all about it. That is just how Joe was.

I have a new one I got a couple weeks ago at a show and I was looking forward to showing it to Joe. I will miss that. **Bye Joe...** 

# CMP... A Blast From The Past

We had a very successful CMP season last year with lots of participants new to CMP and M1 Garands. We all had a great time and our discipline is growing. We have been asked on many occasions if folks can shoot their service bolt action rifles at our CMP matches. Normally our CMP matches are restricted to M1 Garands, M1A's, and AR15's. However, we are going to try something a little bit different at our March 2008 CMP match. We are going to include a bolt action service rifle portion to the match. While we haven't worked out all the details/ rules as yet it will pretty much go like this: Rifle: Any military service bolt action rifle with iron sights. (Must be in military configuration, no sporters)

Course of Fire: Will be same as regular match, total of 50 rounds for count (more for sighters) shooting prone with sling, sitting with sling, and off hand no sling. Some will be slow fire and some will be rapid fire. We will allow more time for bolt action rapid fire.

**Distance:** 100 yards (possibly 200 yards if weather permits).

This would be a great opportunity to break out your Springfield 03's or 03A3's, Mausers, Enfields, Krags, or even your M44 and just come out and have some fun. Our CMP matches are fun matches with the emphasis put on safety, learning, and fun.

Remember, anyone, whether a member or not can come to a CMP match and for \$25 shoot an authentic M1 Garand. The cost includes the class (a requirement for first time CMP shooters), use of club Garand, ammo, and targets. If you have your own Garand and ammo, the match only cost is \$10. Following are our 2008 match dates so come on out and have a good time.




