
Hunter Education

It's time to be thinking of your family members who may need a Hunter Education card next year. If your young shooter is planning on hunting deer and elk next year, and is between the ages of 12 and 18, a Hunter Education card is mandatory for the young hunter. There are two ways of acquiring a card. Attend a series of classes and a field day from a volunteer instructor OR if time commitments are challenging with schedules, you can now take self-paced online classes available through the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW). After the student has passed their online class they are required to attend a two day class and field day testing to complete the process and acquire the card.

Douglas Ridge Rifle Club instructors are teaching several classes this year. Our only inhouse class, which is open to all potential students in the area, starts in January. This class will be on three consecutive Mondays and Wednesdays, the 12th, 14th, 19th, 21st, 26th & the 28th, with our field day and testing done on Saturday the 31st. All classes are mandatory. The online application and list of available classes can be found at or.outdoorcentral.us/or/license. When the class is posted you can sign up until the class is full. Please have your students SSN# and a credit card handy when you are trying to register. You can also look up and sign up for classes at other locations as they become available. Check the website often for changes and additional classes outside DRRC.

Those wishing to sign up for the online self-paced classes can do so here www.dfw.state.or.us. Go to the HUNTING tab at the top of the home page and click it. Then you click on the Hunter education and events tab, and click the Online Hunter Education Courses or Workbook Option to register for the computer based study. Remember if



you're taking the online classes you need to also take the field day and final exam with volunteer instructors so plan accordingly. Our DRRC home study field day/final exam classes will be June 9th and 11th, July 7th and 9th, and August 11th and 13th. You must attend both nights of the field day/final exam nights to complete the requirements and receive your card. These classes will be posted to the ODFW website a couple of weeks before class starts so you can use the online registration to sign up for them.

Additionally if those of you who have exceeded the age of 18 and plan to hunt out of the country or in other states outside of Oregon, almost all other states require some form of Hunter Education to be able to buy tags. Plan to attend our January class or take the online course and field day/final exam classes so you can be ready when you win that raffle of a lifetime. *Don't* wait until July to start thinking of and trying to get into a class!!! We as instructors are in the field starting in August and will not be available for last minute classes.

The DRRC instructors are also teaching a Master Hunter class for eligible adults on Wednesday April 8th at DRRC. Master Hunter opportunities for extra hunts start each year in July. There is a home study component, a volunteer requirement, a shooting proficiency test, and a four-hour classroom requirement before you can obtain your hunting opportunities. The information and registration is available at the ODFW website listed in the second paragraph of this newsletter article. After you've clicked on the Hunting tab, click on the Master Hunter Education link and follow the directions for registering. It does take a little time and discipline to finish the course. If you want to take the April class as part of the program you will need to start your studies very soon to complete all of the requirements before the April class. We will post the class to the website a couple of weeks before it begins so you can register for it online.

For those young hunters who may not be ready for a Hunter Education class (age, inexperience, etc.) the State of Oregon also offers a youth mentored hunt program. The Program allows youth 9 through 13 years of age to hunt without first passing an approved hunter education program. It gives unlicensed youngsters the opportunity to receive mentored, one-on-one field experience and training on the ethics, safety, responsibility, and enjoyment of the hunting while closely supervised by a licensed adult. See the ODFW website under the Hunter Education Tab listed above to find out about this great opportunity for younger hunters. All of the information that you need to experience this opportunity with a young hunter is found there.

Once again I cannot stress enough that you need to plan EARLY! Start your research now so you don't get caught without being able to find a class.
