The Grant is for a new Indoor Range Ventilation System and we will need lots of volunteer help to get everything completed. Oscar Bloom will be the project manager and he can be reached at 503-674-9385. Feel free to call him with your expertise in Sheet Metal, Electrical, Carpentry, Etc. Do not be shy as this project will be a great addition to the club. Also, along with the new ventilation system we will also have

some new lighting installed in place of all the old trac spot lights. Tri - Phase Electric of Portland was the low bidder for the contract for this phase of the indoor range project. The new lighting will be 50% cheaper to operate, and give out better light so the shooters can see the paper targets and hopefully hit them.

To all members. Cameras have been installed in the indoor range to hopefully catch the person or persons who are shooting up the indoor range. This was an expense we did not need but it is quite expensive to repair the target frames on a weekly basis. Please shoot at only your paper targets and not the wood.

I hope to see a great big crowd at the July 7th General Meeting. There will be refreshments and goodies for everyone. So come on out and vote for your new officers. Safe Shooting!

Mini Palma Fun Match

On July 18th we will have our first .22 cal Mini Palma match. This will be a fun evening for all ages. We will be shooting .22 cal rifles at simulated ranges of 800, 900, and 1,000 vards by shooting at reduced sized targets from 100 yards. You may use any .22 cal rifle and .22 cal match ammo. There will be six classifications: Match rifle, scoped, optic sight (red dot), iron sights and Sporter rifle, scoped, optic sight (red dot), iron sights. Matches will consist of 15 for score shots at each simulated range (800, 900, 1,000) to be completed within 45 minutes (includes prep time and sighters). Depending on the number of shooters attending, we plan to shoot two matches for a possible total of 900 points.

"The Other Shooters"

I get complaints: I shoot XXX and those YYYs have the range every weekend.! I shoot ZZZ and those MMMs have the range all day every Thursday. I shoot the BBB discipline and the IIIs get every second Sunday each month but my disciplne is bounced around — why can't I have a special day every month? I want to shoot by myself at the 100 vard Range and practice precision shooting – then someone comes in and starts shooting as fast as he can with a semi-automatic right next to me. I pay my dues and when I come out the cops are on the range and I can't shoot. There is some class going on every weekend and I can't ever shoot indoors. . . . Ad Naseum.

#1: Disciplines and other events are scheduled as they are requested, within constraints of history, number of shooters involved, and availabilty of ranges. Realize, there are only a finite number of Saturdays and Sundays in any given month. We try to accomodate all the disciplines and as many shooters as possible.

#2: When shooting at any range you will have to accommodate other shooters; this is their range too. You may not like their way of shooting or their gun, but if they are safe and within the rules they have the same rights as you. You may think that your way of shooting is the best or only way, but guess what: there are

other opinions.

#3: We allow non-member individuals and groups to use our range under strict rules, and by prerequest and approval. We have frequent classes which are scheduled after the disciplines have scheduled their requests, and various law enforcement agencies use our range monthly. These groups are allowed under our by-laws guidelines. Their use is secondary to the disciplines and members' use but we also recognize the need for training of individuals and law enforcement and continue to support these sectors. Range use by these groups are charged and provide a significant enhancement to the DRRC annualrevenue.

So, how do we determine who can do what, what is okay and what is not? We have three basic criteria: #1: Is it Safe? / Does it go by the Published Rules?

Safety is always the first consideration. DRRC has Standard Operating Procedures for all ranges. These rules are revised periodically to consider changes in shooting conditions, facilities, and discipline needs. Please be familiar with both the the general SOPs and the specific SOPs for the ranges you use. It is your responsibility.

#2: Is Damage Being Caused?

Damage, purposeful or inadvertent, is expensive to the club and is potentially unsafe. For example, posting targets on the 100 yard carrier supports, rather than the plastic carriers, causes the supports to be shot up and the need to be frequently replaced. Shooting steel targets with a center-fire rifle on the Silhouette Range causes damage that results in the necessity of frequent replacement of those targets. Shooting cans, bottles, and other non-allowed targets increases maintenance time and wear on equipment. Shotguns on the Indoor Range? - **Hello!!!**

#3: Is There a Courtesy Issue for Other Shooters?

You have the responsibly to consider your fellow club members.

If a shooter is shooting a rifle off a rest one shot-at-a-time attempting maximum accuracy and another shooter sits down beside him with his AR-15 and cranks off twenty rounds in as many seconds there is a problem with courtesy. Both shooters have their own point-of-view and a right to shoot their guns, BUT — consider the other person! The Benchrest shooter is distracted by the fast-fire shooter next to him. We are a club because we are a conglomerate of shooters, disciplines and interests. I want to shoot my Colt .45 SA at fifty feet, you want to shoot your .300 Winchester Magnum at 200 yards, my buddy wants to shoot his 12 gauge at "birds" flying away. This is a shooting club — let's all do our own thing and allow others to do theirs.
