Farewell Military 9mm

The Joint Combat Pistol was the name for a U.S. progam for a new military sidearm to replace the M9 Pistol, extant from late 2005 to early 2006. The program is being run by USSOCOM as of 2005. It is the result of a merger of two earlier programs, the Army's Future Handgun System (FHS) and the Special Operations Forces Combat Pistol. Among the current requirements for the JCP, include being chambered for .45 ACP, having an integrated rail, Day/Night sights, and capable of accepting a suppressor.

Requirements were based on original solicitation, which was later modified, and finally, heavily changed in March 2006, with the program renamed to Combat Pistol.

The notice starts: The USSOCOM intends to issue a solicitation to obtain commercially available non-developmental item (NDI) Joint Combat Pistol (JCP) system, Caliber .45 (ACP).

Two configurations required: One with no external safety and the other configuration will have an external safety.

The 'Combat Pistol System' is to consist of:

• a Caliber .45 pistol (designed for AA475 and AA18 rounds)

U.N. vs U.S. Guns

With an absurdly lengthy title that tells you all you need to know, the "U.N. Conference to Review Progress Made in the Implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects," will begin Monday, June 26. This meeting is a follow up to the "U.N. Conference on the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons" meeting that we reported on in the summer of 2001. At that time, we told you that the Bush Administration made it perfectly clear that the United States would not support any proposal that threatened our Right to Keep and Bear Arms.

But the U.N., fueled and financed by the likes of Rebecca Peters and George Soros, is at it again—and with a vengeance.

NRA Executive Vice President Wayne LaPierre has aptly noted that the Right to Keep and Bear Arms in defense of self, family, and country is self-evident. In essence, our Second Amendment shows profound respect for human freedom, worth, and self-destiny.

But two centuries after it was codified into our Bill of Rights, the U.N. is trying to declare that this civil liberty is a cause of the world's violence. It is trying to claim jurisdiction over sovereign American citizens by crafting a global treaty that calls on us to surrender our firearm freedom and accept whatever lesser standard of freedom—if any—the U.N. deems appropriate.

The United States is the last truly free nation standing, offering every law-abiding human the greatest measure of freedom mankind has ever experienced, and neither the United Nations nor any other foreign influence may claim jurisdiction to meddle with the freedoms guaranteed by our Bill of Rights.

SAF Celebrates San Francisco Court Victory

Bellevue, WA – The Second Amendment Foundation (SAF) said today's decision by the Superior Court in San Francisco to throw out that city's handgun ban was a victory for gun owner rights all over the Golden State. "The right of citizens to be safe in their homes and communities can never be subject to a popular vote," said SAF founder Alan Gottlieb. "This ruling shows that the politicians who pushed this gun ban were wrong.

"It is astonishing that in a city where the leaders preach how open they are to diversity, they encouraged voters to blindly march to the polls last November to practice a blatant, egregious and despicable form of social bigotry against their neighbors and fellow citizens," Gottlieb observed. "Working to deprive others of their property and their right to self-defense just because you don't like firearms is morally repugnant, and with today's

ruling, the people who pushed Proposition H last fall should feel ashamed of themselves.

"Today's court decision to essentially nullify the election was predictable because state law clearly prohibits the adoption of local gun control laws, no matter what the process," he added. "The Second Amendment Foundation fought this battle and won more than two decades ago. We'll fight it again tomorrow if necessary.

"It's one thing to make a political or social statement," Gottlieb stated, "and San Francisco is famous for that sort of thing. But when making such a statement crosses the line of state law and the fundamental right of self-defense, not to mention depriving citizens of their personal property, the only responsible course is to stop such nonsense.

"We're proud to have worked once again with the National Rifle Association, to protect the rights of law-abiding citizens, as we did in Louisiana last year to stop gun confiscations following Hurricane Katrina," Gottlieb concluded, "and we're delighted to have been joined by the Law Enforcement Alliance of America and California Firearms Retailers Association. The good citizens of San Francisco and their elected leaders should devote their time to more worthwhile endeavors."

Child Safety Lock Act of 2005

ATF March, 2006 newsletter

This serves to notify you that Public Law 109-92 (119 Stat. 2095), the Protection of Lawful

Commerce in Arms Act, was enacted October 26, 2005. Section 5 of Public Law 109-92, cited as the Child Safety Lock Act of 2005 (CSLA), amended the Gun Control Act by adding Section 922(z) to 18 U.S.C. This new section makes it generally

unlawful for "any licensed importer, manufacturer, or dealer to sell, deliver, or transfer any handgun to any person, other than another licensee, unless the transferee (buyer) is provided with a secure gun storage or safety device for that handgun." The statute provides that it becomes effective on April 24, 2006. Consistent with the requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act, ATF will publish an Interim Rule in the Federal Register regarding the new law.

As enacted, the law does not require safety devices to be provided where the handgun transfer is between FFLs. The law provides for additional


