What a Rip-Off (?)

I recently returned a phone call to the Club from a man who was looking for a place to shoot, because he has several rifles and he doesn't like to shoot in the woods. When I told him our annual dues are \$150 a year to be a DRRC member, he angrily hung up the phone while he muttered "what a rip-off." That got me to thinking a little bit. I realize new members pay more, as do those who pay the work hours assessment. And Old Time members pay less. But most of us pay the \$150 annual dues amount. Is it a rip-off?

The annual dues works out to be \$12.50 per month. For \$12.50 you can buy about half a box of .30-06 Core-Lokt ammunition. Or you could buy a Federal .22 LR Value Pack, getting 325 rounds. You could buy two lunches at McDonald's, if you didn't supersize them. You could save your monthly \$12.50 for a year and a half, and buy a Ruger 10/22 to shoot those .22 rounds. Or you could save your \$12.50 for a little over three years, and get a Marlin lever action rifle. Save up for four years, and you could buy a used .357 revolver. You could use the \$12.50 to buy some extra gasoline, and drive your pickup about 50 miles to get to the woods and back for shooting.

The bottom line is that, sure, it looks like a lot of money when we get our dues statements. But when we compare it to other costs we experience, it doesn't look so bad. And what do we get for our \$150 a year? I happen to think our range and our facilities look great, and are in good shape. The first couple hundred members' dues cover the



cost of the maintenance for the Club. The next seventy-five or so members pay for the utilities. The next sixty members pay the property taxes. Then the next one hundred members pay the insurance bills. Unfortunately, more than a hundred members pay the attorney bills. And a similar number of members pay the environmental maintenance bills. Some of us pay the janitor bills, the fuel bills, the accountant bills, the office supply bills, and the costs to produce this newsletter and have a Christmas party. And we haven't even talked about buying new equipment, or building new facilities for all of us to use and enjoy.

"What a rip-off"? What a bargain!

Next time you are talking to a friend about shooting, ask him or her why they aren't taking advantage of the great bargain we offer for membership at Douglas Ridge Rifle Club. Share our story, and bring a new member into the Club.

Scout Troops regularly visit the range for shooting activities and camping. But the Scout visit on Saturday May 19th was a little bit different. The Lewis and Clark District was holding their annual Camporee at McIver State Park. And since the theme was Top Shot based, the Camporee Planning Committee and DRRC Scout Coordinator Arlo Gatchel had approached the Club to see if they could incorporate DRRC into the plans. After working with **Executive Officer Mark Edwards** to find a suitable date and ironing out detail with the Board, the Scout event was approved. So while the Scouts competed with tomahawks, darts, blow guns, throwing knives, sling shots, etc. at the park, they also made bus trips to DRRC to shoot .22s on the Indoor Range and black powder rifles on the Dynamic Range. Shooting took place in groups, and ran from nine in the morning until about four in the afternoon.

DRRC Scout Coordinator Arlo Gatchel reports: "We had 228 Scout shooters and many first time shooters at either the .22's or black powder. Twenty troops were represented from Lewis and Clark District, which covers to the south; the Clackamas River, to the

north; the Columbia River, to the west; the Willamette River and to the east 205 freeway. Fortyone patrols with 4-10 boys each came to DRRC in four bus loads. The Scouts had many smiles and a sense of pride when they were able to hit the targets with accurate rifles because of the loan and use of DRRC .22 caliber rifles.

The outstanding help from the DRRC RSOs was greatly appreciated from the scouts and many adults. There was a lot of coaching and one-onone teaching from the RSOs at the indoor range. Many adults came up to me and commented how positive the interaction was between the RSOs and the boys. This was a great way to introduce some of the scouts to shooting firearms in a safe and correct way. I think many seeds were planted for future safe use of firearms. Many boys will remember this first time because of the actions of the RSOs. The RSOs did a great job. Many adults commented positively about the club in general and were very grateful for use of the Indoor and Dynamic Ranges.

Chief RSO Michael Jones recruited sixteen RSOs to help at the event, making sure everyone was safe and seeing that the Scout event did not interfere with membership shooting on the other ranges. Several NRA trained Scout Leaders called the lines and loaded the black powder rifles for the Scouts. Other Scout Leaders gave safety instructions to the Scouts waiting for their turns to shoot. The District Camporee staff even prepared lunch for all the DRRC volunteers.

Sp4c. Dahl distinguished himself by conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity while serving as a machine gunner on a gun truck

near An Khe, Binh Dinh Province. The gun truck in which Sp4c. Dahl was riding was sent with 2 other gun trucks to assist in the defense of a convoy that had been ambushed by an enemy force. The gun trucks entered the battle zone and engaged the attacking enemy troops with a heavy volume of machine gun fire, causing a large number of casualties. After a brief period of intense fighting the attack subsided. As the gun trucks were preparing to return to their normal escort duties, an enemy hand grenade was thrown into the truck in which Sp4c. Dahl was riding. Instantly realizing the great danger, Sp4c. Dahl called a warning to his companions and threw himself directly onto the grenade. Through his indomitable courage, complete disregard for his safety, and profound

concern for his fellow soldiers, Sp4c. Dahl saved the lives of the other members of the truck crew while sacrificing his own. Sp4c. Dahl's conspicuous gallantry, extraordinary heroism, and intrepidity at the cost of his life, above and beyond the call of duty, are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit on himself, his unit and the U.S. Army.
