The first ever DRRC USPSA training class was held on April 17. It was an exciting high powered day of training, shooting, and safety. The class began at 1 pm with our instructor, Paul Meier, going over the training manual. From there we went into practicing stance, grip, aim and the over all shooting position. At the shooting range we practiced these newly learned techniques until we had a grasp on them. We then moved on to more intense stages, shooting from behind barricades, 55 gallon drums, inside boxes and on the move. After every stage Paul had us evaluate ourselves, and then he evaluated us. The day ended at 5 pm with our instructor giving us a

demonstration on how these stages are really suppose to be shot. For anyone looking to improve your handgun shooting skills, I would highly recommend this class. It was the most entertaining, high energy class I have ever taken.

Appropriate Targets

There continues to be a problem with members shooting inappropriate targets and sometimes with inappropriate backstops. We have found pieces of metal and glass used as targets at the 100 yard range. Also the cinderblocks that we use to weight down the portable standards are being shot. Sometimes targets are being placed on the target posts which destroys them. Except for the existing steel swingers and gongs *only paper targets are allowed* on the 100/200 yard range.

We continue to find bullet holes in the Indoor Range baffles and the red lead-stops, as well as the posts and target carriers. *Be sure of your target. Keep your finger off the trigger until ready to fire.* You've heard this before, right? Members, please report any infractions you might see to Michael Jones, CRSO.

the only reason there are holes in the 2x4's and the 6x6 at the floor. It can't be because you are bad shots because you can all hit clothespins and pistol casings.

Sweeping: All ways sweep from the tiled area out onto the painted area. We have juniors lying on the floor and want to keep the lead and unfired gunpowder off the tiled area.

Misfire rounds: Dispose of misfires properly; DON'T throw them in the trash.

Well that's enough to start with. If you have any pet peeves look for the Home on the Range box at the indoor range (coming soon) and put them in there. They will be picked up and sorted out to put in future newsletters. Remember the range belongs to the members, do your part to help keep it safe and clean. Doing stupid things usually causes stupid accidents. *Good shooting!*
