Other members continue to hone their skills, increase their average, and enjoy getting together for a great time shooting and sharing. And the pizza afterward doesn't hurt either!

The Columbia-Willamette Rifle League (CWRL) currently consists of seven teams. They are: Vancouver Rifle and Pistol Club, Portland Rifle & Pistol Club, Clatskanie Rifle & Pistol Club, The Dalles Rifle and Pistol Club, two teams from Tri-County Gun Club, and the Esco team which is now the DRRC team. There are numerous proposed gun and gun related laws being introduced across the country as well as in the state of Oregon. Some of these are laws that anti-gun people were working on for some time, some are ones that some legislators just came up quickly so as not to get left on the roadside in the rush for "change", and yet others are bills that have been kept in the shirt pockets waiting for a "good crisis" to come along. Atrocities like the one in Arizona and recently like the accidental shooting of a classmate here in Oregon fuel and give the public the opportunity for a knee jerk reaction to consider voting in such laws that will affect only the lawabiding and not those who care little for what the law says.

It is hard for any of us who are members of a gun club to imagine legitimately why fellow Americans would attack us and our rights so relentlessly. We see the ownership of firearms and what we use them for as a form of enjoyment, a way to get outdoors to enjoy hunting, or perhaps as a fun form of collecting. Unfortunately the truth is that there are many individuals and organizations out there who are more than willing to take your rights away from you in order to attempt to mould things to what they see as a better society for them, ironically not seeing that when one of the Amendments goes down in part or whole, the rest of the of the Amendments are in danger also. There is a reason I believe that the first and the second amendments are directly next to each other and are the first two listed, they are directly connected to each other, often the second amendment is represented as the teeth of the constitution, the final defense against totalitarian government intrusion.

To say that there is an easy and uncomplicated way of doing battle to fight these new proposed gun laws would

be misleading; to say that you'd only have to fight the battle once would be to not pay attention to history. We as responsible gun owners are in a battle, not a shooting one but one that takes place between those who want to vote us out of our rights and us voting to keep those rights deemed inalienable. It seems to have been some time since we've had law makers here in Oregon that have voted for what we wanted instead of telling us what we should want from them. The battle will not only be long but it will be ongoing, not just for our time but for the times of our children. It will be harder for our children if we don't do our part now, actually if we refuse to fight, it will be our children who again will pay the price.

The way this battle progresses is not with the firearms that we enjoy so much and often see as a symbol of our freedom. This battle is done over the phone calling our representatives to tell them over and over what we want done, it is done by pen and paper writing letters to those who will listen (and those who won't) to express our opinions and desires, and on the computer staying up on new proposed laws and sending emails to those whom have been elected and given the power to represent us. Sadly most of us in the "silent majority" continue to mostly sit on our hands allowing those in the minority to push us into a smaller and smaller corner without much more than a whimper and a sigh. To join the fight isn't that difficult or dangerous, but if we are going to keep our rights (all of them), you need to stand up and be counted.

Fighting for our rights is a relatively simple and painless process, if you can write, call on a phone, or use a computer you can exercise your God given rights as an American. Go to the Oregon State Shooting Association website (OSSA. com) to keep abreast of laws being proposed and what is in them. There are also other sites like the NRA/ILA website that are there to make it easier to keep us informed as to what is being proposed. These and other websites give you the information of what can affect your constitutional rights, most will also give you the contact information needed to send to your legislators. The process is simple, find out what is going on, and write a letter in whatever manner you see fit, or make a phone call if that is easier for you. The most important thing you can do above all of these is to get out and vote, and to get those who think like you to vote also.

I've seen where this country could go from my travels abroad, it is very possible that we could end up like other countries who used to enjoy gun ownership and who now are enjoying rising violence in their societies long after guns were taken from the law abiding. In some countries it is now a jail offense to have a pocket knife of any size with a locking blade. I hope you'll decide to do something if you've been reluctant in the past, or if you're already active in the battle that you'll spread the word and convince others to join us in keeping what is ours.
