

Service Rifles Cross the Course

Saturday August 9th saw the second and final Service Rifle Cross Course match for 2014. Twenty shooters participated, on a day that was hot and sunny, but not too windy. There was a good mix of experienced shooters and first time shooters, with an age range of 24 to 71 years old. So you see that anybody can participate in these matches.

For some background, service rifles are typically the M1 Garand, the M1A, and the AR-15 version of the M16A2. However, our DRRC matches are "fun" matches, and any correct service rifle with iron sights is allowed. Occasionally, a 1903A3, an M1 Carbine, or even a Mosin Nagant has been seen on the firing line. DRRC owns several Garands that are available to use in the Service Rifle matches. There are also a few Club AR-15s that are reserved for those junior or lady shooters who aren't ready for the Garand. Club ammo purchased from the surplus ammo supplies of the Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP)

is also available to purchase. And the evening before every service rifle match, there is a class for the new shooters to get familiar with the match, the Garands, and the target pits if it is a cross course match. Cross course means the match is shot on the Known Distance / long distance range. Service rifle matches are cross course in July and August. Other months the service rifle matches are shot on the 100 Yard range.

At the August cross course match, the course of fire was 10 slow fire shots standing offhand at 200 yards, 10 rapid fire shots sitting at 200 yards, 10 rapid fire shots prone at 300 yards, and 20 slow fire shots prone at 600 yards. Total was 50 shots for score, plus sighters, so the maximum score available was 500. The shooters were split into two relays, with one relay on the firing line while the other relay scored targets in the pits. The relays switched back and forth until all firing was complete. Shooting began at 9AM, and the last shots were fired around 2PM. After putting all the targets back in storage, and returning all of the Club guns, spotting scopes, and mats to the vault, the shooters gathered to hear the scores and applaud everyone for their efforts.

Since Charlie McAlister was injured and unable to compete, he volunteered to run the firing lines all day, which allowed Discipline Director Todd Hanson to compete, and Todd turned in the high score for the match, a 423. However, he was shooting an AR-15, so he got a little friendly grief for that. Curtis Choy was 2nd overall high score and 1st high score with an M1A at 418. And Scott Tedrow to 3rd overall high score and 1st high score with a Garand with a 409. Erik Westenskow also bettered 400 points with a Garand, shooting 403. Hector Benavides (387) took 5th overall and 2nd M1A. Joe Keller (368) was 6th overall and 3rd Garand. Dan Lurvey (348, Garand), Shari McAlister (345, Garand), David Bryson (335, M1A) and Allen Westenskow (329, AR-15) rounded out the top ten.

Other competitors were Todd Caldwell, Aaron Hochstrasser, Rich Knox, Roman Kolyvanov, Jake Nelson, Bill Paugh, Pete Roth, James Strange, James Vigil and Mark Vigil. Scores for all competitors and the breakdowns by stages are available on the Club web site Service Rifle page. Everyone indicated they had a good time, and everyone knows they have room to improve.

The next Service Rifle match will be held on Saturday December 13th. The match will be shot on the 100 Yard Range, under cover in case of inclement weather. The class for new shooters is Friday evening the 12th. A registration link for the class is on the Club web site, or you

procedures for the entire time of his membership? At a recent RSO meeting, it seems I'm not the only one to hear a similar comment.

There have also been some issues on how to call the line cold. Communicate to all shooters that you'd like to call the line cold to give others time to remove their magazine, show an open chamber with the action open, insert a chamber flag (optional, but a good idea), engage the safety and step back behind the yellow line. Then call "The line is cold" and turn on the red light. As long as the line is cold, remain behind the yellow line and NO touching anything on the shooting bench. Remember to set unnecessary shooting gear (range bag, targets, stapler, etc.) on the shelf behind you on the wall. Then you won't need to get to the bench on a cold line.

As an RSO, I take range safety seriously. I became an RSO because I care about this Club. I don't want anyone injured, anymore lawsuits, or anything jeopardizing this Club that results in restrictions on my or your use of it.

Please take the time to refresh your memory on the Club's SOPs that are in the Member Handbook. It can be found on the Club website at http://www.douglasridge.org/drrc_handbook.pdf. If you don't have internet access and would

like a copy, please call me (503/666-3761) or any Board Member and I will make sure to have one sent to you. Better yet, come to a Regular Meeting and ask for one. SOPs are something that are revised periodically and should be reviewed on a regular basis. Did you know that the Board of Directors has temporarily suspended all handgun shooting at the 100-200 range due to safety concerns?

There is a lot to keep up with so that DRRC remains as safe as possible. And remember, you don't need to be an RSO to point out a safety concern to a fellow member. Just try to be as polite as possible about it. You can find a copy of the Member Handbook on every range for reference if needed.

Oregon Long Range Championship and Leupold Cup Tournament

Douglas Ridge Rifle Club was host to the Oregon State Long Range Rifle Championship and Leupold Cup Tournament August 23rd and 24th. This tournament consisted of five 20 shots strings of fire all fired from the 1000 yard line. Twenty nine competitors were on hand from as far away as Connecticut.

This tournament consisted of four divisions. Palma/Match/Any Rifle (all fired from a sling), Service Rifle, "F" Target Rifle, and "F" Open Rifle.

During Saturday's 3 strings competitors could use "Any" sights (scope). This was for the Oregon Wimbledon Trophy and the Leupold Cup. Felix (Bud) Solis was the days winner with a score of 583-20x out of a possible 600.

Sunday's 2 strings were fired with iron (open) sights. David Littlefield was the Iron Sight winner with a score of 385-13x.

Deputy Sheriff and Reserve Marine Sean Bell of Bend hung in there all weekend and emerged the aggregate winner to become this year's State Long Range Champion with a score of 969-30x. Sean was followed closely by Solis who fired 968-33x.

Other winners were Mike Vashaw in the Service Rifle Division, Jay Chrisopherson, "F" Open Division, and Monte Milanuk, "F" T/R Division.

Our final Long Range Matches of the year will be held October 18 & 19. These will consist of a Palma Match (15 record shots at 800, 900 & 1000 yards each) and 20 additional shots at 1000 yards each day.

Registration begins at 8AM and firing commences at 9 AM each day.
