President's Report



Upland Game Birds

Upland game bird populations
are naturally cyclical, and to reflect
that, seasons are set under a five-year
framework. So hunters won't see
many changes this year, though Blue
Mountain turkey hunters will enjoy
more tags.

In terms of production, though this was not a record year, hunters should find plenty of opportunities. Westside upland game bird production was good this year, according to Upland Game Bird Program Coordinator Dave Budeau, while eastside production was more varied

Hungarian (Gray) partridge: For all of eastern Oregon, Hun populations appear to be slightly higher this year than last, but below the recent five-year average. Morrow and Umatilla counties are reliable places to find birds.

Chukar: Statewide averages are down from last year. In general, northeast Oregon and Columbia Basin areas saw improvements in the number of chukars over last year. However, chukars in Lake, Harney, and Malheur counties experienced poor production. Hunters will likely have to work harder to find birds in these popular chukar hunting destinations.

California quail: Surveys in western Oregon suggest increased production over last year. California quail populations in eastern Oregon may be down slightly from last year, but in most areas, hunters probably won't find much difference from last year. Bobwhite quail, which look similar to California quail but are not native to the state, may

now be taken during California quail season.

Mt. quail: About 75 percent of the statewide harvest occurs in the southwest part of the state. Production in this region appeared good with populations up over last year. The Umpqua and Rogue districts will be hunters' best bet for Mt. quail. Limited areas of eastern Oregon are open for mt. quail hunting. Hunters are reminded to check regulations for open areas where reduced bag limits are in place.

Pheasant: Statewide populations appear to be up slightly over last year. Hunters can expect to find a few more birds in areas of the Columbia Basin. Hunters in the popular north Malheur County area should encounter numbers of birds comparable to last year.

Blue grouse: Statewide, populations remain below average. However, blue grouse appeared to have experienced better production this year and hunters should expect to find a few more birds than last year.

Ruffed grouse: Populations of ruffed grouse have also been below average in recent years, but these birds also experienced improved production in 2007, especially on the west side of the state. East side hunters should expect to encounter numbers of birds similar to last year.

Sage-grouse: Surveys indicate that sage-grouse numbers are down. Extremely dry conditions have likely contributed to poor production. Biologists observed about one-half the typical number chicks on the surveys. Permit number were reduced for sage-grouse controlled hunt because of below-average production in core areas and fires in sage grouse habitat.

Turkeys: Turkey numbers appear to have improved slightly over last year. Best numbers of birds can be found in northeast and southwest Oregon where there are fall hunting opportunities. Blue Mountain turkey tags were increased from 300 to 400 this year. The spring season is statewide. Though most turkey hunters are already using smaller shot, a new regulation reduces the maximum limit of shot from BB to #2 for safety reasons because the smaller

shot does not travel as far.

Mourning doves: Numbers of doves appear down slightly from last year, but are above the recent five-year average. In Oregon, weather often dictates the success of the season for these early migrants. Eurasian collared doves, which look similar to mourning doves but are not native to the state, may now be taken as mourning doves.

Wing collection: ODFW needs your help. ODFW would like to extend the wing collection effort to include blue and ruffed grouse and mountain quail harvested in western Oregon. The data collected during these efforts helps biologists accurately determine upland bird populations.
